Greetings from the FAC Membership Committee

As most of you know, it is that time of year when we remind you that *your dues are due on or before March 15, 2012*. We will be sending out notices shortly. First, via email, and then by snail mail to those who do not remit by early March 2012. This will be a first so we hope it will be a success to aid us in curbing postal costs and saving the FAC some money. When the announcement arrives *please take a moment to read and respond to the few questions on the renewal form so we can update our records based on your wishes*. Here we would like to highlight four FAC members. **Edward Schneider** is a recent Florida resident who moved to Florida after many years in the southwestern U.S. He received his Masters Degree in Anthropology from the University of New Mexico in 1993 and worked for an environmental firm for over 15 years as a Cultural Resource Program manager. He is a recent past President of the Wyoming Association of Professional Archaeologists. We hope that he will like his relocation to sunny Florida and become as active a member of the FAC as he was in Wyoming.

Jeremiah Kaplan graduated from Leiden University with a Masters of Archaeology in 2009. He is interested in the Archaeology of the pre-Columbian peoples of the Caribbean and Florida. His thesis was on a site in Puerto Rico studying structural analysis. He has worked at sites in the Caribbean, Southeast U.S. and Northeast U.S. and hopes to become more involved with “Florida’s cultural heritage.”

Antoni Paris has over 10 years of experience in archaeology and is likely our first FAC member who has done the bulk of his field work in Europe working at medieval castles to Neolithic sites in Cyprus. His Masters in archaeology is from the University of Warsaw and he is a member of RPA. His dissertation is *Preservation of Archaeological Resources in the United States: Cultural Heritage and the Law* where he brings his years of experience promoting Florida’s archaeological and historical heritage to an international forum through such publications. Monica Beck is also an archaeologist with many years of experience from her earlier years working at plantations and other sites in South Carolina to more recent projects as field site director at the Arcadia Mill Archaeology Site just north of Pensacola, which is one of the oldest industrial sites in the Southeast. She has been an active member of the Society for Historical Archaeology and we hope she will be for the FAC.

2012 John W. Griffin Student Grant**

The Florida Archaeological Council is making available a maximum of \$2000.00 this year to be awarded to archaeology graduate students (M.A. or Ph.D.) who are currently enrolled in a Florida university. The grant money will assist students conducting archaeological research in Florida. Grant funds can be used to cover the costs associated with archaeological fieldwork, special analyses (e.g., radiocarbon dates, faunal or botanical analyses, soils analysis, etc.), and, in some cases, travel expenses related to research. The entire amount may be given to a single individual or it may be divided up among applicants at the discretion of the FAC Griffin Award Committee.

Students interested in applying for the grant should submit a 2-page letter describing the project for which the funds are being requested; what research question(s) or problem(s) are being addressed; how the funds will be applied to these problems; what, if any, additional funds will be used to accomplish the research; and how the research will contribute to Florida archaeology. Accompanying the letter should be a budget indicating the amount requested and describing how the money will be spent along with a letter(s) of support from faculty.

FAC MEETING MINUTES

DRAFT MINUTES

Florida Archaeological Council Board Meeting
May 6, 2011, 12 p.m. EST, Orlando, Florida

In attendance – P. Jones, E. LeCompte, E. Benchley, R. Gougeon, D. Ruhl, and D. Kloetzer

General Comments – P Jones provided an update about FAM meeting, namely that all parties involved wish to move away from DHR grant-based funding. FAS, FPAN, and FAC will seek other donors and options to fund production of the poster and promotions. FAC will continue supporting with our usual donations, of course. General discussion followed, during which it was suggested FAC add language to the membership form stipulating that the “Special Category” donation would go to FAM. FAC could also do more to advertise FAM on our website and newsletters.

Officer's Reports

Secretary's Report – minutes from February 2011 meeting were approved.

Treasurer's Report – report was summarized by P Jones as M Bland could not be in attendance. The organization is financially stable. The Gov't Affairs fund is now solvent. General discussion followed previous meetings, with Board wishing to be mindful about keeping “cash on hand” to assist when needed.

Checking - \$ 6945

CDs - \$ 26,083.10

Committee Reports

Membership Report – At the time of the meeting approximately 75 members had paid their 2011 dues, a 25% drop over the previous year. D Ruhl agreed to stay on as Membership Chair until 2012. A new chair is desperately needed.

Curation Committee – A general discussion of the Wheeler/Miller curation study centered on the absence of universities from the survey. The impression that universities do not have curation issues similar to CRM, State, and Federal entities is a false one. How the omission of universities from this study can be addressed, though, is unclear.

Election/Nomination Committee – Two Board members are cycling off (E LeCompte and R Wentz). Lee Hutchinson and Tom Pluckhahn have agreed to join Board. Additionally, B Handley is willing to withdraw from Board, to be replaced in the final year of the term by Michelle Williams.

Website – A draft of the consultants list to be placed on the website has been drafted, but universities that do compliance work need to be added.

Old Business – The status of a proposed FAC meeting with Seminole was summarized from an email from G Ballo. A hoped for August meeting date was proposed. All dates, venues, and final plans need to be circulated for approval.

New Business – D Ruhl proposes a Student Affairs Committee, but this idea was tabled for now.

Meeting adjourned 1:05 pm EST.

General Comments – P Jones welcomed our members and thanked them for attending the General Meeting of the Florida Archaeological Council.

Officer's Reports

Secretary's Report – minutes from February 2011 meeting were approved. R Gougeon noted that he has a batch of previous meeting minutes to send to D Kloetzer for the website.

Treasurer's Report – report was summarized by P Jones as M Bland could not be in attendance. The organization is financially stable.

Checking - \$ 6945
CDs - \$ 26,083.10

Committee Reports

Membership Report – At the time of the meeting approximately 75 members had paid their 2011 dues, a 25% drop over the previous

year. D Ruhl also reported 6 new applications! It was announced that D Ruhl agreed to stay on as Membership Chair until 2012.

FAC/FAS Liason – (see New Business)

Archives and History Committees – All available archives and the recently completed histories (2 of 3 parts) are ready to be submitted to the PK Young Museum of Florida History.

Government Affairs Committee – R Gougeon discussed a “wait and see” approach to dealing with the current Governor and Legislature. N White asked if/how DHR was being reorganized and what was known about these changes. R Wheeler has been asked to supervise the Compliance section, and replacements for retired personnel would not be available. The Bureau of Archaeological Research is renamed the Bureau of Archaeological Services, and the San Luis site may be moved to the Cultural Programs and out from under BAS. BAS was also no longer accepting “Smart Forms” for site information, only pdf. N White suggested that DHR inform FAC of their changes so that we might better circulate this important information.

Curation Committee – P Jones summarized the general discussion of the Wheeler/Miller curation study as held in the preceding Board meeting. The impression that universities do not have curation issues similar to CRM, State, and Federal entities is a false one. Suggestions from the Membership as to how the omission of universities from this study can be addressed were solicited and will be forwarded to the authors of the study.

Stewards of Heritage (2012) – The venue may be the council house at San Luis. Call is made to start thinking of candidates for this award.

Griffin Student Award – Two awards were made in March 2011. John Krebs (UWF) and Caitlin Kelley (USF) were each awarded \$1000 in support of their projects.

Election/Nomination Committee – Two Board members cycling off (E LeCompte and R Wentz) received the Board’s and Membership’s thanks. Lee Hutchinson and Tom Pluckhahn have agreed to join Board. Additionally, B Handley is willing to withdraw from Board, to be replaced in the final year of the term by Michelle Williams. These changes were approved by the Membership.

Website – Members in Good Standing and the March newsletter are posted. A redesign of the website is in the works. An idea to model Florida’s consultants list on the Council of Texas Archaeologists was proposed (essentially, there is a \$100 fee for listing). Other members commented that listing was thought to be a privilege of membership. Further discussion of this issue is required.

Old Business – The status of a proposed FAC meeting with Seminole was summarized from an email from G Ballo. A hoped for August meeting date was proposed, and FPAN (Ft. Lauderdale) offered to assist with some logistics.

New Business – B Austin recapped FAS’s annual woes regarding FAM. An ad hoc committee drawn from membership of FAS, FAC, DHR, and FPAN is being formed to consider how each organization can help free FAM from DHR grant cycles. FAM would remain an independent event. FAC was asked by FAS to participate, with FAC Board members noting that our support in the past has ranged from \$1000 to \$2000. A motion made for FAC to formally support efforts to make FAM financially independent, as our coffers allow, was proposed, seconded, and passed.

K Sassaman, as SEAC 2011 Meeting Chair, is soliciting funds/donations to defray costs of receptions. D Ruhl proposed buying a small ad to promote FAC and support the SEAC meetings in Jacksonville, Florida.

Meeting adjourned 1:25 pm EST.
